### Trip Reports

#### Slimbridge, Gloucs — Saturday 12th November 2011 (JP)

Twenty of us set off for Slimbridge in November in weather that turned out to be more like September, mild and sunny. After an early getaway and the decision to forego a motorway breakfast we arrived at 9.15, to find we were too early to get in and coffee in the car park was not our usual treat!

However our two groups had a good selection of birds including White Fronted geese, Pintail, a Peregrine Falcon from tower hide, Water Rail, and Snipe. Redwing & Fieldfare were spotted and we had close views of a very late Sedge Warbler. Linnet, Yellowhammer and Reed Bunting were also nice to see.

A great end to the day was the swan feed particularly as some of the Bewick swan had literally just arrived. There were some big families of up to five young, many jostling for the best feeding positions and nervously squabbling away, especially the youngsters for which it was all completely new. It was a great experience to see the end of a long migratory journey happening a few yards in front of us. A very rewarding trip with 63 species for the day.

#### Ladywell Reserve & Whitacre Heath NR, West Mids Saturday 17th December 2011 (GT)

A cold day and a doubtful forecast looked to be in prospect for our day trip as we drove to our first site Ladywalk Reserve in the Tame valley in North Warwickshire. A permit only site which had not been explored by any of the group present previously so we were pleasantly surprised at the variety of habitats we discovered.

As soon as we started out and before entering the actual reserve we had an obliging Grey Wagtail along the river together with assorted duck and Little Grebe. Once in the woodland area we soon had Treecreeper, Siskin, Redwing, Redpoll and Bullfinch plus a Cettis Warbler was heard to add to our list. The river and pools revealed Goosander, three Little Egret flying by and a Green Sandpiper.

After lunch we drove the short distance to the nearby Whitacre Heath Nature Reserve which also forms part of the Tame valley floodplain network. Good numbers of Fieldfare and Redwing were seen and a mixed flock of Siskin & Redpoll high in the treetops challenged our neck muscles. A single Raven was also observed and heard overhead. A total of 55 species over two new sites for the group.

## Trip Reports cont'd

### Grafham Water, Cambs, Saturday 14th January 2012 (PS)

The coldest start I can recall on a trip, a balmy minus three degrees when we arrived at Grafham. A very nice site and we soon had some good quality sightings, Green Sandpiper, Grey Wagtail, and Goosander. There were distant views of a Great Northern Diver, a few Ruddy Ducks that had avoided the shotgun and most of the normal waterfowl.

Good views of a drake Scaup was a first on an SLB trip. There were good numbers of Fieldfare and Redwings. In the small bird department the picks were Treecreeper, Blackcap, Bullfinch and Goldcrest.

An entertaining day right to the end when several of us were locked in the car park!! Another first. A respectable 59 for the day
